

9:20 – 10:00 Keynote: *Justice and the Conservation of Marine Biodiversity*Professor Chris Armstrong – University of Southampton

Biodiversity loss is one of the most significant challenges facing the ocean today. As well as harming marine organisms themselves, biodiversity loss could have very serious impacts on millions of people who depend on the ocean for food and other ecosystem benefits (with those who are already disadvantaged being hardest hit). But conservation policies can themselves trigger injustice, if designed and implemented badly. This talk will first clarify some key principles for fair burden-sharing in marine conservation. Second, it will argue for a relative shift in focus away from marine protected areas, and towards more holistic conservation policies which keep the consumption habits of the globally advantaged firmly in view. Finally, it will investigate principles for fair inclusion in decision-making when it comes to marine conservation.

This panel addresses how multiple concepts of justice (ranging from cognitive, distributive, corrective, to climate justice) could shape the oceanic space. This panel critically discusses the tensions between international policies *vis-à-vis* the local needs of coastal populations. The speakers highlight how the diversification of marine activities space may amplify the risks of invisibilization of local communities. Arguably, these emerging conflicts can be managed through area-based management tools, which have increased in popularity over the last two decades. In this panel, the speakers explore the relationship between area-based management tools, socio-environmental (in)justices and spatial conflicts.

## Getting to the city center from Gothenburg Landvetter Airport:

## By Bus (Recommended Option)

**Airport Shuttle (Flygbussarna)**: The **Flygbussarna** airport shuttle bus is the most convenient way to get from the airport to the city center. Buses depart every 15-20 minutes.

You can buy your ticket <u>online</u> or on the bus (credit card only). The bus ride takes about 25-30 minutes to reach the city center.

For those staying at <u>Hotel Flora</u>, your bus stop is called Kungsportsplatsen and to the hotel is a 3-minute walk.

#### By Taxi

Taxis are available directly outside the arrivals terminal. Depending on traffic, a taxi ride to the city center takes 20-30 minutes and costs **450-600 SEK**.

Ensure you ask for a fixed price before the journey starts.

#### Transportation in the city

We recommend downloading the app <u>Västtrafik To Go</u>. With a single ticket, you can take buses and trams.

## Getting to Sjöfartsmuseet Akvariet (Address: Karl Johansgatan 1-3)

From Brunnsparken or Kungsportsplatsen, take Tram 3 (toward Marklandsgatan) or Tram 9 (toward Kungssten).

Stop: Stigbergstorget. From there, it is a short walk west to the museum.

## Getting to Ågrenska Villan (Address: Högåsplatsen 2)

From the city center (Brunnsparken or Kungsportsplatsen), take Tram 4 (toward Mölndal) or Tram 7 (toward Tynnered).

Stop: Vasaplatsen. From there, it is 5-minute walk.
